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Our School

Our School Today

An Innovative Approach For A 21st Century Education.

Located in Townsville, Enkindle Village School is an independent, government accredited primary school offering democratic education. We use the Australian National Curriculum as the basis for our education, but deliver it through a holistic, innovative and inclusive approach. Through our democratic nature, we have the ability to draw on the best aspects of many different methods of education. We use current research in pedagogy, curriculum and the neuroscience of education to inform our teaching and learning methods.

History

Enkindle opened its doors in 2019 to a small cohort from Prep to Year two. We have seen rapid growth and tripled our numbers over the following years and now offer Prep to Year 6. The school has gone from offering one, multi-age, class to four.

Our Philosophy

Our philosophy of education is founded on democratic principles, with the belief that people affected by a decision should have a voice in that decision.

At our school children can explore their interests at their own pace, in their own way. When children are guided with kindness and respect in a setting that allows this freedom to discover, they thrive.

Our Values

Liberty

Autonomy - Voice - Responsibility - Equity - Impact

Personal freedom: in this context is the ability to take charge of one's own learning. Children learn out of interest and curiosity, so it makes sense that they have some autonomy in what and how they want to learn. We don't all learn the same way and don't all find the same things interesting. When children have no autonomy, boredom is often the result. The main characteristics associated with autonomous learning are: resourcefulness, adaptability, initiative, and persistence.

Liberty is differentiated from freedom in that it takes into account the rights of all involved. As such, students learn that with rights comes responsibility. Children need practice in order to become good decision makers and problem solvers, and taking risks is an important part of growing and learning. While our school encourages student self-management we understand that the natural progression from childhood into adults requires some guidance and will assist children in recognising responsible action and their consequences in a safe and nurturing way where necessary.

This looks like...

- Everyone has a valid and valuable voice.
- Individualised learning programs designed with the students and family: we help students approach the curriculum in a way that suits their own learning styles, preferences and personality.
- Student participation in school decision-making; for example through student councils and
- student-teacher-administrator committees.
- Honouring individual needs and encouraging the development of our own judgement; eq. Children determine when to eat, when to take a break, etc.
- No rewards, shame, bribery or punishments.
- Encouraging students to negotiate, take risks and set boundaries.
- No "boss" but clear leadership: mutual respect between adults and children.
- No uniforms, use of first names for adults and children.
- Preference to natural consequences and reflection (quided when necessary).

Our Values Cont...

Curiosity

Natural - Play - Learning - Creativity - Innovation

We cultivate a school environment where children are encouraged to learn the necessary skills to truly prepare them for a successful future. When children are given liberty and autonomy in a nurturing and playful environment, the result is creative and innovative thinking. We also encourage reflection, debate, discussion and evaluation of current educational thought on a whole school level. Understanding that by being open to the latest research we can incorporate the very best of contemporary knowledge about teaching and learning to become more innovative and effective educators. This looks like...

- Nurturing creativity and imagination in students with the understanding that this is the basis for all human ingenuity.
- Using current findings from progressive education and related fields to improve learning opportunities and student well-being.
- Constantly developing new partnerships within our community to allow us access to cutting edge technology and resources.

Joy

Connection - Community - Kindness - Respect - Balance

What is learnt in joy is never forgotten. Time and again research shows that it is through play that children discover and acquire fundamental skills and understandings. It is in their nature to explore, be active and interact with their environment. At Enkindle Village School we place value on our children finding joy in their day to day school life.

This looks like...

- Encouraging and honouring children's ideas, opinions and choices.
- Striving for peaceful interactions and conflict resolution.
- Play-based learning in the 6-9 years group, as well as dynamic learning environments.
- Conducting a significant amount of learning outdoors, children engage better in a natural environment.
- Valuing character development equal to intellectual development.

Our Curriculum

At Enkindle Village School, we use the Australian National Curriculum as the basis for our education, ensuring that all students are in line with their peers across the state (and country).

As a school that values community and innovation, our aim is to remain flexible to continue to meet the needs and wants of our local community for decades to come.

Our Curriculum encompasses our values of Liberty, Joy and Curiosity. We value our students and their individual interests as aim to incorporate their interests and learning styles into as much of our day as possible. Much of our learning is hands-on and play based as we believe what we learn in joy, we remember. Our students are not in competition with each other. Each student focuses on their own learning needs and development. We don't use rewards, bribery or punishment but aim to instill a natural love of learning in our students.

As 21st Century learners our students are bombarded with a wealth of content at their fingertips. We instead focus on the development of skills that allow them to become successful learners across all content areas. The rapid change in technology we see will require people who show:

- Cognitive flexibility and the ability to adapt to change and conceptualise complex multiple ideas all at once
- Digital literacy and computational thinking and the ability to adapt to changing technologies; some of which haven't even been invented yet
- Judgement and decision-making skills
- Emotional and social intelligence
- Creative and innovative mindset
- The ability to work with others

We encourage the development of these skills through multi-age, integrated project-based work that links to real-life concepts. Our students are given responsibility for decision making at Enkindle around learning, behaviour and the day to day operations of the school. This freedom and choice are balanced with responsibility. Our students help with aspects of the school such as cleaning, gardening, maintenance and they serve on the justice committee to help resolve playground or classroom issues using restorative justice practices.

Our integrated units are based around a real-world, macro concept such as 'Sustainability' or 'Change' which allows our students to become fully immersed an engaged in their learning and to see the many connections, and skills that can be transferred, between the learning areas.



FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


During 2021, Enkindle Village School continued to apply conservative and sound financial management and the school continued to enjoy relatively stable enrolments. The School's auditors, Cardell Assurance & Audit have issued an unqualified audit opinion on the school's financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2021. The attraction, development and retention of high-quality staff continues to be the cornerstone to delivering a great education to our students. Employee costs remain the largest single item of expenditure, with a key metric throughout the year being "salary cost as a percentage of net revenue". For 2021, this percentage is 70% compared to 77% for 2020, reflecting continued focus on staffing profiles and development as well as a focus on the most economically sustainable classroom structures and distributions.

Net operating surplus for the 2021 financial year was \$46,670.72. The school experienced another strong financial year in line with the budget expectations.






ENROLMENTS

Board Report

2021 has been another big year for our small school and the management committee. The annual report is always a good opportunity to look back and we can reflect on the significant achievements our school has made over the last 3 years. Of course this is not without hurdles, but we continue to learn, grow and improve with each challenge that comes our way.

We would like to start by acknowledging and thanking our Enkindle team. Our school is fortunate to have a dedicated, experienced and passionate group of staff who aim to ensure our vision and mission is met every day. Our staff are pivotal to our success and the community as a whole remain thankful for their efforts.

We are thankful to our students who live our values of liberty, curiosity and joy every day and their families who place their trust in the Enkindle team. Our students remain at the centre of everything we do.

The Board achievements across 2021 included development of a board charter, formalised delegations document and commencement of a sub committee which allows us to bring expert knowledge and skills to the table.

This year we look forward to expanding the Board with new Board members to elect at the AGM as well as continuing to grow and move into the next phases of our development.

Forest School is the perfect way to take our learning out into the environment around us. Students learn to understand biology, seasons, weather patterns as well as social skills such as communication and collaboration.




SUSTAINABILITY

JCU


